

Course Description (structure/delivery)

English Advanced is designed for students to undertake the challenge of higher-order thinking to enhance their personal, social, educational and vocational lives. These students apply critical and creative skills in their composition of and response to texts in order to develop their academic achievement through understanding the nature and function of complex texts.

The English Advanced course is designed for students who have a particular interest and ability in the subject and who desire to engage with challenging learning experiences that will enrich their personal, intellectual, academic, social and vocational lives. They study challenging written, spoken, visual, multimodal and digital texts that represent and reflect a changing global world.

YEAR 11 COURSE (120 Hrs)
