BELLINGEN FINE MUSIC FESTIVAL - MUSIC BY YOUTH PROJECT

What an inspiring initiative is the **Music By Youth Project** of the **Bellingen Fine Music Festival**, which this year runs from September 21–24. Introduced in 2014, this program enables some of our most talented young musicians to soar.

Pippa West, Katelyn Phinn and Donovan Taylor from our school are three of the six area Higher School Certificate music composition students thrilled to have been chosen to be participants this year.

A highlight of the project is that all six students went to Sydney for a recording of their composition performed by the Acacia Quartet at the Fine Music 102.5 FM Recording Studio for their HSC submission. The Acacia Quartet will play their compositions at the Youth and Exuberance Concert of the Bellingen Youth Orchestra at the Festival.

Three students from our school also entered the preliminary round earlier in the year of the **Music By Youth Composer Slam**. One student, Pippa West, has been selected to be in the final round to be held during the festival, which will be adjudicated by one of Australia's leading composers, Elena Kats-Chernin.

As a fitting tribute to the late Peter Nance, **Camp Creative** supports the **Music by Youth Project**. Support has also come from the Australia Govt Festival Australia. The opportunity to work with a professional ensemble and be mentored by professional composers is very rare in our region. The project with this support helps offset this lack of opportunity.

DISABILITY PROVISIONS FOR THE HIGHER SCHOOL CERTIFICATE EXAMINATIONS 2018

According to NESA, Disability Provisions in the HSC are practical arrangements designed to help students who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt to show what they know in an exam room. NESA grants specific provisions based on specific evidence about the student that demonstrates how the student's exam performance is affected by a diagnosed disability.

Applications are made through each school. Students must submit a completed NESA Medical or Vision form from a medical or other professional who is not related to them and complete a Student Declaration. Teachers will be asked to complete a form that focusses on how, in their professional opinion, the diagnosed disability affects the examination performance of the individual student in their course and how the specific provision will help them. Depending on the provision, a student may have to arrange specific reading, writing or other testing. It is also

important to note that evidence must be dated no more than one year before the 2018 HSC. If all the necessary information is not provided, some requested provisions may be declined by NESA due to insufficient evidence or in certain cases, where there is no evidence of ongoing treatment or therapy. Provisions are also declined when the evidence does not demonstrate that the impact of a student's disability in examinations will be relieved by a particular provision, or if testing results do not indicate a need for according to their guidelines. Applications for the 2018 HSC should soon be open. All students who wish to apply for disability provisions for Year 12 must see Vicki Greer, Learning Support Coordinator, as soon as possible to discuss their needs, what evidence may be required and which provisions may be most suitable, particularly as time is often needed to make specialist appointments.

This includes all students who were granted provisions in 2017. Some pathways students who have had provisions for HSC exams this year may need to reapply, depending on the nature of the disability. In line with the College Disability Provisions Policy, Disability Provisions will not be granted for college based examinations in Year 12 until a student begins the process of applying for NESA provisions and supplies the appropriate evidence.

Disability provisions also apply to temporary and emergency-related disabilities. A typical example of an 'emergency' is where a student breaks their writing arm a week before an examination and would require a writer, for example. Students who become ill during an examination period may be eligible to make an illness/misadventure application rather than a disability provisions application. We have been advised by NESA that this also applies to conditions that may or may not affect a student during an exam, such as migraine headaches.


Our dinner was a chance to farewell our board members and to welcome the new. Congratulations to our new board members:
